ACT Grants Awarded

Three grants were recently awarded to organizations that benefit the Albemarle EMC service area.



The Boys and Girls Club of the Albemarle received \$3,000 to expand youth programs into Perquimans County. The funding will purchase books, STEM kits, art supplies, athletic equipment and technology to for academic achievement.

The Albemarle Pregnancy Resource Center received \$2,000. The grant



will be used to purchase supplies for their Earn While You Learn parenting program participants. Supplies will include diapers, wipes, baby wash, lotion shampoo and diaper cream. The center provides weekly parenting education classes, mentoring sessions and monthly group activities for women who are pregnant or parenting children through four years of age.

The Dream Hunt and Fishing Program received \$5,000 to help support educational events, dream hunting and fishing trips, Outdoor Adventure



Camps, Exploring Surf, Sound and Sand Program and Exploring River, Sound and Woodland youth camps. The programs are geared toward youths ages 2 to 18 years of age and specifically youth with medical conditions, disabilities or those who have been identified by school systems as at-risk.

The trip funds will be used for lodging as well as food and travel costs for the families.

AEMC to Cease Paying Transaction Fees



Albemarle EMC will cease paying members' transaction fees, beginning Jan. 1, 2026.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2026, Albemarle EMC will no longer pay the transaction fees incurred when members pay their power bills with a credit card or electronic check.

Banks and credit card companies charge transaction fees when credit cards such as Mastercard or Visa or electronic checks are used to settle a transaction. Over time, as more and more payments are submitted electronically, those costs have continued to rise. As such, starting Jan. 1, members who use a credit card to pay their power bill will be responsible for paying their 2.45 percent transaction fee. Members who use an electronic check will pay their \$1 flat service fee.

Because of these changes, members who do not pay their bills with a credit card or electronic check will no longer be subsidizing those members who do. Members who do not use credit cards or E-checks will see no changes. Members can easily avoid having to pay transaction fees using the following methods: paying cash or check in person at our office, mailing in a check payment, or setting up a checking account automatic bank draft.

As a not-for-profit company, Albemarle EMC has a fiduciary responsibility to maintain the financial health of the cooperative. Albemarle EMC's goal is always to provide service for as close to at-cost as possible. This sometimes means making changes to ensure that the cost of service is allocated fairly.

Christmas Presents that Save Energy

Having lived now more than half a century, I have reached a stage in life I call "peak stuff." I have accumulated pretty much everything I need, so if anything extra is going to be added to my life, it has to be practical.

Assuming you have folks on your Christmas list like myself, I have compiled a list of energy efficient Christmas gifts that could be perfect for that special someone.

Water heater blankets can be used to wrap electric water heaters that are located in unconditioned spaces such as garages. These



blankets are sold oversized so they can be trimmed to fit most waterheaters. Simply wrap the water heater like a Christmas present, taping

the seams. These blankets will typically save between 4 and 9 percent in water heating costs. It is important to note that these blankets should not be used on gas waterheaters due to fire hazard.

Low-flow shower heads are another great idea to save energy. By reducing the flow of hot water, your water heater has to reheat less cold water, resulting in a



savings of anywhere from 25 to 60 percent, according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

A smart thermostat is a Wi-Fi enabled device that automatically adjusts to energy-saving temperatures when you are asleep



or away. Geofencing enables your smart thermostat to know when you're on the way home and automatically adjust your home's temperature to your liking. You can also control your home's heating and cooling remotely through your smartphone.

Smart LED bulbs can be adjusted from a smartphone or manually and can adapt to your routines. They last up to 25 times as long as incandescent bulbs.



LED string lights are a great option for your holiday decorating. They use 90 percent less energy than incandescent string lights and are cooler to the touch, which reduces the risk of fire.

An electric slow cooker is a great way to avoid having to use a



large conventional oven to cook a large meal. A slow cooker will use half the energy of a conventional oven. For smaller meals, a microwave oven is another great option. Microwaves can use 80 percent less electricity than a conventional oven. They are also much faster, saving time in the kitchen.
